

From The Director's Desk

I take pleasure in placing the ANSISS Annual Report for 2016-17 before you. While doing so, I may like to mention that the Institute was constantly engaged in its quest for new ideas and exploring the unexplored during the year concerned. As a part of this endeavour and in search for new epistemological base for development and change. I am pleased to share with you that the Institute could successfully organize international seminar on 'Cohesive Development: an Alternative Paradigm"? The single most important focus of the seminar was to build up an alternative development paradigm. The response of the scholars from



several countries was overwhelming. Around 70 scholars from UK, Germany, Canada, Netherland, Brazil, Bangladesh and India attended the seminar. While debates and discussions were held to a scale unmatched to the one witnessed in the recent past by the Institute, conviction on the possible emergence of another world deepened. So much so that the seminar could foresee how the theoretical edifice of the alternative paradigm could evolve further.

The new series that the Institute launched during the year concerned is what is called "Development Dialogue series' was extraordinarily academically rewarding. What is, however, equally important to note that it attempts to offer new policy perspective to the government of Bihar. While the series began with the "Ouality of Education in Bihar', "Land Reforms, Water Conservation and Agricultural transformation in Bihar", "Social Transformation of Bihar through Empowerment of Women of the Marginalised Community: Rhetoric or Reality?," and "Malnutrition among Children and Women in Bihar: A Comprehensive Picture" were organized subsequently. Lecture series to commemorate Champaran centenary celebration and Foundation Day lecture delivered by eminent scholars were some additional stimulating intellectual events ANSISS witnessed during the last year. Internal seminar presented by the faculty members had been an equally encouraging and fruitful experience. The significant aspect of all these activities is that the proceedings of all these programmes are published and disseminated to all concerned. Besides, Institute is now regularly bringing out its Newsletter (biannually), monograph series and Journal.

The contribution of the faculty members towards research, presentation of seminar and writing papers in reputed journals was immense for the Institute to take a step forward. As many as 20 research projects were completed, 14 research papers were published in the peer reviewed journals in addition to chapters in edited volumes and monographs and as many as 10 papers were presented by the faculty members in different national and international seminar during the period concerned. The contribution of the doctoral students to the annual research corpus was also of considerable significance.

At ANSISS we continue to pool our resources not only from the government of Bihar and ICSSR but also from other sources so that financial hardship cannot deflect the Institute from its objective of achieving excellence in the creative world of knowledge. In the face of multiple challenges, I seek your support in our endeavour to achieve the same.

About The Institute

Anugraha Narayan Sinha Institute of Social Studies was established by the Government of Bihar, in the fond memory of Dr. Anugraha Narayan Sinha (18 June 1887 to 5 July 1957). Dr. Sinha was an Indian statesman and ardent follower of Mahatma Gandhi since the days of Champaran Satyagraha Movement, also, first Deputy Chief Minister-cum-Finance Minister (1946-1957) and one of the architects of modern Bihar. The Institute was inaugurated on January 31, 1958, by 'Desh Ratna' Dr. Rajendra Prasad, the first President of India. Later it was made a statutory autonomous body through legislation of The Bihar Gazette (EXT) on the October 8, 1964, under the Anugraha Narayan Sinha Institute of Social Studies Act 1964, by the Government of Bihar. The Institute is governed by the Board of Control and funded by the Department of Education, Government of Bihar and Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), New Delhi through Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India.

The purpose and powers of the Institute as laid down in the ANSISS Act, 1964 are:

- To undertake teaching and research in Social Sciences;
- 2. To undertake study of specific problems, as and when required by the State Government or the Central Government or any other agency;
- 3. To provide training and research facilities in social, economic and administrative problems;
- 4. To publish journals, books, pamphlets, brochures, and other materials as may be deemed necessary;
- 5. To organise lectures, seminars, and conferences, and
- 6. To undertake other allied activities.

Research Area

The research theme of the Institute broadly focuses on development and change, with special reference to Bihar. Efforts have usually been made towards studying the mechanisms and processes of change in the wake of development, within appropriate theoretical and conceptual framework. Issues and problems within above framework are identified and analyzed towards finding their solutions.

Accordingly, researches of theoretical and empirical nature are broadly diagnostic, evaluative, and prescriptive having had its relevance to the economy, society, and polity of the country in general and the state of Bihar, in particular. The aforesaid studies are conducted by the faculty members of the Institute. Special attention is paid to the study of the under-privileged and the rural poor, especially the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, women, and other socially and economically disadvantaged groups, within the disciplines of Economics, Sociology and Social Anthropology, Social Psychology, Political Science, Public Administration, Social Geography, and Non-Violence and Peace. The Institute has multi-disciplinary operational character and approach. Concerted efforts are made to take full advantage of the multi-disciplinary structure of faculty members at the Institute. While each discipline pursues its own research programme, there are number of research projects in which members from

different disciplines come together to analyze the problems at hand with a common perspective so that an integrated view of the social reality could emerge. Over the years, there has been an appreciable expansion of activities at the Institute with a strong multi-disciplinary approach of the faculty members supported by research scholars.

Today, it is one of the most prestigious social science research institute in India. Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi has recognized it as the Centre of Excellence in the field of Social Science research. Several international organizations including UNICEF, World Bank, ILO, WHO, DFID, UNDP, etc., in addition to the State Government and the Government of India, offer research assignments to this Institute on priority basis. It is also considered as one of the most important research institute by the government. The Institute has acquired a high status in the scholastic world for its quality of academic output.

Campus and Resources

The Institute is located in a sprawling campus situated at the southern bank of the Ganga. It is just 2 km from Patna Railway Junction at the North West end of Gandhi Maidan. Even though located in the heart of the city, it boasts of its picturesque location with quiet surroundings.

The Institute has a spacious three floor building having the Academic-cum-Administrative Complex. It houses the administrative office on the ground and the first floor. A three storey building for library and support office is attached to the main building. In addition to this, there is another three storey Hostel-cum-Guest House which provides accommodation to the Institute's doctoral fellows and visiting scholars.

Faculty and Staff Quarters

The Director and some senior members of the faculty have been provided with accommodation in the campus. Buildings are proposed to be constructed for the faculty members and supports staffs.

This campus has also been a part of the great heritage and freedom struggle. Mahatma Gandhi had visited Bihar before independence and had stayed in this campus from March 6, 1947 to May 24, 1947 (except 1-14 April), adjacent to the house of Dr Sayed Mahmood, the then Minister of the Government of Bihar (presently the Director's Bungalow).





Library

The ANSISS library started in January 1958. The first book " नेहरू अभिनन्दन ग्रन्थ (Abhinandan Granth)", was accessioned by the library on April 16, 1958. The book was edited by Dr. Rajendra Prasad, First President of India, and Nehru Abhinandan Samiti and published by Aryavart Prakashan-Grih, Kalkatta (now Kolkata) in 1949 having 615 pages. The book mainly covered the life and work history of Jawaharlal Nehru. It also threw light on the Indian history.

The library is housed in its separate building of three floors. The second floor of the library was inaugurated on December 1, 2011 by Sri Nitish Kumar, Chief Minister of Bihar. The library of the institute claims to have outstanding collection of books, reports and journals in Social Sciences. Ex-Prime Minister of India, late Smt.

Indira Gandhi, also paid a visit to this library on January 4, 1984; Silver Jubilee Celebration of this Institute. During 2016-17, the library added 196 books and 63 reports and bound volumes of Indian and foreign journals. The institute presently subscribes to 90 Indian and 53 foreign Journals and receives 23 journals in exchange.

The library also subscribes to some important national and foreign weeklies besides newspapers. At present, the library has 33240 books. In addition, there are





32968 bound volumes of journals and reports. The Library has also started Current Awareness Services (CAS) of recent reports and publications of ANSISS. It provides a host of 'Users Oriented Services' such as Reference Services, e-Journals, Documents Delivery Services (DDS), Institute's News Services (INS), Seminar Alerts, Bibliographic Service and e-Library Services.

ANSISS library has access to most of the databases of Social Studies. New books and reports of the library are

powered by e-Granthalaya. Library has extended facility for free access to e-resources from NASSDOC-ICSSR. Students can access full text journals titles from the following databases apart from subscribed e-journals on Statics IP address. The databases are -

- Online EPW
- EconLit (EBSCO)
- **JSTOR**
- India Stat and Prowess

Besides, there are CDs in the stock as well. Many institutions including ICSSR, New Delhi and individuals have been sending complementary copies of their publications to this library. Various Government agencies, State Assembly, UNESCO and ILO regularly send their reports and publications.

The library has also received personal collection of Lok Nayak Jayprakash Narayan (JP) as a gift from him. The collection consists of nearly 3,000 books on wide range of subjects. All of it has been kept under separate section known as the "JP Collection". The institute's library has been designated as one of the Depository Libraries in India by International Organisations like UNCTAD and UNESCO.

Computer Centre

The Institute has a full-fledged computer lab, equipped with more than 25 computers with high speed internet access having NKN support. The computer lab has been developed to enable the Doctoral fellows to have an adequate exposure to computer based research tools and access to research and development networks across the globe. With support from ICSSR, the researchers at the institute have begun to access some of the key e-resources.



Advanced statistical software is also accessible on case basis. However, it is in consideration for unrestricted availability. The lab is also being used by the project staffs who are working under different research projects of the institute.

Seminar and Conference Halls

The Institute has a large air conditioned conference hall and three well-furnished seminar halls with comfortable seating arrangements. The conference hall has the capacity of accommodating 220 people, where conferences, seminars and public lectures are held generally.

The seminar halls are of medium and small sizes with seating capacity of 80 and 35 people respectively. They are used for orientation and training programmes, workshops, academic debates, discussions, meetings of the Board of Control, etc. In addition to these air-conditioned Conference and Seminar Halls, the Institute has an Open Hall on the second floor of the building, having a capacity to accommodate 80-100 persons, which is generally used for training, workshops, and other miscellaneous purposes.

Census Station

A workstation for research on Sample Micro-data from Census has been set up at the Institute with the initiative and support of the Director General Census, Government of India through the Director Census Operation, Bihar. The ICSSR New Delhi also encouraged in setting up the workstation and extended financial support to the Institute for the same.



The workstation will cater to the needs of data for conducting research. Besides, it will help the researcher to analyze data by way of bringing advanced analytical software.

Hostel and Guest House

The Institute has a good quality hostel-cum-guest house, which serves dual purpose of guest house for the visiting scholars and hostel for the ICSSR Doctoral Fellows. It is a three-storied building with single and double rooms, lounge and mess facilities. There is also a newly constructed guest house, named after Late Shri Madhu Limaye, famous Indian Socialist Parliamentarian, separately.





Health Centre

The Institute has now an in-house health centre facility for all members of the institute. There is provision of a doctor to provide medical treatment to the members of the institute on weekly basis.



Academic Divisions/ Centres

Division of Economics and Agriculture Economics

This division largely relates to micro and macro development: sectoral and spatial, agriculture, land reforms, political economy of development, poverty, institutional and infrastructural questions along with poverty, livelihood, nutrition, education, natural resource management, irrigation and water management, employment and labour, human development, and welfare programmes etc. The dynamics of rural economy is being probed in all its diversities with special reference to the state of Bihar. A number of research projects have been taken up on these themes.

Division of Sociology and Social Anthropology

The research interest of this Division lies in the exploration of culture of poverty with special reference to SC and ST and in ascertaining the role of women and their status in society. Similarly, the impact of changing technology, industrialization, rural development and developmental planning on social structures receive attention of the faculty members of Sociology. Now the faculty members have developed experience and expertise in formulating, enacting, monitoring and evaluating various welfare and development programmes of the government in the area of health, nutrition, children, women and other target groups. Problems of distributive justice, education and social stratifications constitute other important strand of research priority.

Division of Political Science and Public Administration

This Division is devoted to the explanation of political progress and political dynamics especially in the state of Bihar. The research themes include political parties, pressure groups, movements, leadership, state politics, politics at grassroots, electoral processes, politics and stratification, politics among the weaker sections and violence. It also provides objective analysis of planning and implementation of government programmes, with respect to agriculture, health, education and welfare. Special emphasis is placed on administration in the district, block and Panchayat levels with a view to suggest improvement in planning, coordination, supervision and execution of various programmes. Voluntary organizations are important areas of enquiry and receive considerable attention from our faculty members. The faculty also specializes in the study of PRI, human rights, particularly child rights protection, child labour, bonded labour etc.

Division of Social Psychology

This division focuses on socio-psychological research on social issues and problems of maintaining social harmony, peace, mental health, physical health and achieving well being and happiness of individuals, society and nation. Some studies have been focused on group behaviour, leadership, social power, student activism, child rearing practices, socio-psychological problems in school education, quality of working life, mental health of adolescents, disability and rehabilitation of children, religiosity and secularism, gender issues, attitude towards dowry etc. Other research areas of the division are social security and old age, family dynamics, youth among marginal sections, malnutrition and children behaviour, food crisis and other issues of public health, climate change and human behaviour, conflict resolution and peace psychology, female foeticide etc.

Division of Statistics

Division of Statistics has a multifarious role in social science research. It intends to provide technical support to other divisions and faculty members of the institute in data management along with providing training in Research Methods. It has been involved in various socially relevant training and research activities in the area of Decentralized Planning, Disaster Management, Non-conventional energy uses, Adult Education/Literacy, Primary Education, Vulnerability of the society in relation to transmission of HIV/AIDS, Agro-Forestry, Perspective Planning, Poverty Measurement, Panchayati Raj Institutions, Voter Behaviour, Border Area Development, etc.

Research Centers

The need for setting up some specialized centers has been felt since long, where it would be possible to conduct multi-disciplinary research in a comprehensive, longitudinal and cross-sectional frame. The idea of having specialized centers emerged out of the concern for the complex nature of profoundly intertwined economy and social problems of the country. There is an immense need of making a multipronged, collaborative attempt by faculties from different disciplines. Setting up such centers, therefore, is a prerequisite to accomplish the task in view.

Centre for Non-Violence and Peace (CNVP)

This institute has been pursuing its research agenda in the direction of liberation of humanity from feudal exploitation, agrarian violence, social discrimination and injustices, based on glorious heritage of Buddha, Mahavira and Gandhi, who contributed rare learning and knowledge. In order to take up thematically focused task of research, teaching and training with contemporary relevance, the Institute has established this Centre which justifies the legacy of great heritage of non-violence. Basic objectives of this center are to analyze the ground reality and contribute towards knowledge generation in the field of non-violence and peace by comprehension of structural contradictions, conflicts and violence in the society, economy and polity towards refinement of concepts and development of theories of non-violence and peace with contextual contemporary concerns, and to promote research, teaching and training.

Centre of Social Geography (CSG)

Basic objectives of this Centre are to identify several contemporary social inequalities from geographical perspectives; to explain and critique the economic, political and cultural processes that create and sustain social and spatial inequalities; and promote an awareness of social inequalities, affecting the everyday geography of people. In other words Social Geography is primarily concerned with the ways in which social relations, identities and inequalities are created with reference to spatial dimensions and its role in defining and distinguishing between sociology and social geography. The division draws upon political, economic, and cultural fields of geography, but the emphasis remains on social issues affecting people's lives - class, race/ethnicity, gender, poverty, body, health and well-being - and the role of space in creation of social inequality and oppression, particularly in Indian context.

Centre for Democratic Governance and Planning

Initially this Centre was started with funds from United Nations and Government of India's joint programmes on convergence, through the Planning Department, Government of India. This Centre was designated as nodal to conduct training for urban sector professionals in Bihar, under the Support Programme for Urban Reforms in Bihar (SPUR).

Centre for Disaster and Risk Management

Department of Disaster Management, Government of Bihar has accepted the proposal for financial support from the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), New Delhi. The Centre for Disaster and Risk Management conducts all the training programmes, workshops, seminars, conferences pertaining to its domain. The faculties of the Institute have also been part of the roadmap of Bihar State Disaster Risk Reduction developed by the Bihar State Disaster Management Authority in 2015.

Centre for Agriculture and Labour Relations

Proposal regarding Agriculture and Labour has already been submitted to the Government of Bihar. This Centre has started working with various departments of Government of Bihar. Presently, it is working with Department of Agriculture and Department of Revenue and Land Reforms, Government of Bihar.

Centre for Policy Research

This Centre has started organizing many academic activities such as lectures, seminars and workshops on contemporary policy and issues.

Completed Projects

Assessing the Social Impact of Land Acquisition for Nimej, Semra, Balua, Gaighat, Ganguli Road in Buxar District of Bihar

Researcher: Aviral Pandey

Findings: This study assessed the Socio-Economic Impact of the road projects. It was based on household survey, focus group discussions (FGD) in the affected villages, market survey in the affected villages, field observation and informal/formal discussion/meeting with district level government officials.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for Road development in connecting Shivsagar-Chenari Road in the mauja Chenari, Rohtas District

Researchers: Sudhir Kumar, Awadhesh Kumar, Bipul Kumar

Findings: This project was launched to develop a connecting approach road between Shivsagar-Chenari Road (approach road between 15th and 16th km on SH-67) to minimize the distance between Sasaram and Chenari. The road ends at Jagjeevan Canal near the Chenari block. At present heavy vehicles pass through an old bridge built on the canal. Due to load and traffic on the old bridge, the people of Chenari village travel to Sasaram through a diversion near the Chenari Thana. After the construction of bridge people from both sides will be benefited and the distance between Chenari and Sasaram will be minimized. It will not only shorten the distance between Chenari and Sasaram but it will also benefit the transportation from Rampur, Bhagawanpur to Bhabhua and Uttar Pradesh. Once the approach road between Shivsagar-Chenari is completed,

the distance between Sasaram and Chenari will reduce to 20 km instead of 45 km, present distance. The project will benefit the entire region in manifolds. It will also change and improve the lives of people. The Project Road is an important highway which links Chenari, Shivsagar to Sasaram; and Rampur Bhagawanpur to Bhabhua and Uttar Pradesh.

Social Impact Assessment of Proposed Land Acquisition under the project of "Construction of RCC on Khagaria Sonmanki Road" in Khagaria District

Researchers: Sudhir Kumar, Awadhesh Kumar, Anuja

Findings: The newly constructed bridge named "Sonmanki Ghat Bridge" carries much importance in the lives of the adjoining community. There is a developed road to the river Baghmati, Sonmanki Ghat, 7th km along Khagaria – Sonmanki Road. The newly constructed bridge connects the farms of the Rasaunk, Marar, Gharari, and some other communities (to the south of the river) to the district headquarter Khagaria. The residents of villages/ mauzas Sonmanki, Koyala Dih, Dahma Khairi, etc. (to the north of the river) have overcome the hurdle of crossing the river by boats for travelling/ transporting to Khagaria and beyond, as the new bridge has added ease to their life. After completion of the bridge, widening as well as strengthening of the narrow kachcha road connecting the bridge in the North has become more than required to facilitate smooth traffic flow through the bridge to Khagaria and beyond, to serve the very purpose of construction of the bridge.

Dalit Assertion and Emerging Rural Social Formation in Uttar Pradesh

Researcher: BN Prasad

Findings: Broad aim of the study has been to explore and analyse socio-economic changes among dalit community and its resultant impact on traditional rural structure. The study has been carried out in all four regions of Uttar Pradesh with sample size of 800 households. Most of the socio-economic indicators found to be improved in present time as compared to their father's period. Traditional travelling modes are replaced by tempos, jeeps, buses, and trains. Importance of education has been recognised by them as the most effective determinants of social changes. Enrolment status of children has increased and dropout rate has declined. Political consciousness and participation of dalits have improved. Untouchability and discrimination has declined in rural areas as well. Participation of women in family affairs and decision has increased in present time. It has been revealed that 'purity and pollution' criterion of the caste system has percolated downwards and consolidated its hold among sub-castes of dalit community.

Ethnographic Study of Mali Caste in Bihar

Researcher: BN Prasad

Findings: This ethnographic study was conducted to find out present status of Mali caste on various parameters like socio-economic, political, cultural, etc. Sample size of the study was 1414 households. Survey work had been carried out in all (38) districts of the state. Historically,

Mali lived in forest and inaccessible hills; their livelihood was dependent on production of flowers and other agricultural activities. On the basis of field survey it was found that gradually their traditional occupation has changed. Presently, most of them are engaged as agricultural/ non-agricultural labourers and other lower economic activities available in modern times. They are not treated as untouchable but on socio-economic and political parameters they are at the lower echelon. Socio-economic status of Mali caste is very much akin to the Scheduled Tribes.

Social Impact Assessment of Proposed Land Acquisition under New B. G. Line between Barh and Bakhtiyarpur of Patna district

Researcher: BN Prasad

Findings: This study was conducted to explore socio-economic profile of villages and affected people by the mentioned project. Study has examined issues of compensation, people's aspirations, preparedness, and appropriate rehabilitation action plan. It was based on 226 project affected families. The survey work was carried out in Bishunpura and Sherpur village under Sadar Chhapra block of Saran district. The overall scenario of land acquisition revealed that many small and marginal PAFs would either become landless or be left with little amount of land. Most of them were concerned for compensations and job in railways. Environmental issue was not on their priority agenda. Infrastructural facilities like health sub-centres, schools, approach roads, drainage system, anganwari centres, safe drinking water, etc., was found in poor condition in surveyed villages. Agriculture was primary occupation for majority of them. After land acquisition there might be a decline in number of households dependent on agriculture. Social security emerged as one of the major concerns during FGD. The role of women in major family activities, decision-making power, health, and standard of living has increased considerably. The issue of women safety had been a major concern.

Social Impact Assessment of Proposed Land Acquisition under New B. G. Line between Chhapra and Muzaffarpur of Saran district, Saran

Researcher: BN Prasad

Findings: The study was based on 123 households. Overall scenario revealed that many of the PAFs were likely to be dislocated from their village and dwelling units. Majority of small and marginal farmers might spend compensation amount on conspicuous and unproductive uses. Many of them might not purchase new agriculture land, as the amount after other expenses would be insufficient to buy even equal acres of land. There was a possibility that land price would increase in nearby areas due to impeding development opportunities. As a result many small and marginal farmers would become either landless or left with very little amount of land. Most of the PAFs whose dwelling units were likely to be dislocated due to the project, want to settle within the village or nearby surroundings in clusters for safety point of view. Many of the PAFs, especially SCs, reported that they had been dislocated thrice from Diyara areas because of erosion of dwellings by river Ganges. This time it would be their fourth dislocation which is

painful and difficult to settle down. Compensations and job in railways emerged as major concerns. Infrastructural facilities were found in poor states. Agriculture was primary occupation for majority of the households. Social security emerged as one of the major concerns during the FGD.

Social Impact Assessment of 02 Maujas (Villages) - Gadaul-72 and Bahrampur 71 in Saharsa District on Land Acquisition for the Approach Road of Koshi River Bridge from Baluaha Ghat Gandaul, Bahrampur in Saharsa District

Researcher: Habibullah Ansari

Findings: Under that SIA project 02 Maujas of Sahrasa District Bahrampur and Gandaul have been covered. The Project is of construction of 13 km long approach road an important highway connecting NH-57 through SH-56 and NH-107 through Koshi Bridge near Baluha Ghat (Saharsa). It will be the principal north-south road transport route from Western Bund of Koshi River to Hanti Kothi Village on SH-56 at Biraul in Darbhanga District. The impact has been calculated on the basis of selfreported information by the affected families and through the Focussed Group Discussions (FGDs) corroborating by observations of the researchers. The intensity of impact was low which requires few ameliorative measures. The nature of social impact is of both direct and indirect. The cost was less than the benefits. So it was recommended that the proposed land for the project should be acquired after paying the appropriate compensation.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition of 08 villages for the construction of 13.00 KM long extended portion of approach road of Baluaha Ghat Koshi to Hanti Kothi in **Darbhanga District**

Researcher: Habibullah Ansari

Findings: The missing link between Gandual and Hanthi Kothi was urgently required to be constructed. The impact was calculated on the basis of self-reported information by the affected families and through the Focussed Group Discussions (FGDs) corroborated by observations of the researchers. The intensity of impact was low which required few ameliorative measures. The nature of social impact was both, direct and indirect. It was found that the social costs were less than the social benefits of the project. So it was recommended that the proposed land for the project could be acquired after paying the appropriate compensation.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition of Two Maujas (Villages)- Bhagwanpur Chaksekho and Singia Bujurg Basti and Chader-2 in Samastipur District for the Improvement/Up-gradation of SH-88 Varuna Bridge (NH- 103) to Rasiyari Road in **Darbhanga District**

Researcher: Habibullah Ansari

Findings: The impact was calculated on the basis of self-reported information by affected

families, Focussed Group Discussions (FGDs) and observations of the researchers. It was found that the cost was less than benefits in one village but the cost was higher than benefits in another villages-Singhia. After calculating the impacts together and separately it was recommended that in Bhagwanpur land acquisition could be done after paying adequate compensation but in Singhia Buzurg Basti and chader-2 land acquisition could have adverse social costs and thus it could be avoided.

Mid-term Evaluation of Agro forestry Scheme under Hariyali Mission – Poplar and other **Species**

Researchers: D. M. Diwakar, Rakesh Tiwary and Sandhya Mahapatro

Findings: Government of Bihar has initiated special program under Hariyali Mission for expansion of agro-forestry with an aim to raise income level of farmers, make available raw material for wood based industries and increase green cover in the state. ANSISS faculty members Dr. D. M. Diwakar, Dr. Rakesh Tiwary and Dr. Sandhya Mahapatro carried out mid term evaluation study of 'The Agro- forestry Schemes - Polar & Other Species' of the Hariyali Mission program being implemented by Department of Environment & Forest, Govt. of Bihar. Mid-term Evaluation study entailed fieldwork based research on experiences of beneficiaries in Muzaffarpur and Saharsa districts. The evaluation exercise aimed at assessing the uptake of the benefits of program through various perspectives; understanding adoption patterns, identification of key motives for the practising agro forestry as well analysing the barriers in expansion constituted the major themes of the evaluation study. This study was based on primary as well as secondary data. Probability Proportionate to Size method was used to determine number of samples to be covered in different blocks of two districts. To analyse the data gathered, advance statistical techniques were used.

Socio-Economic-Livelihoods Study and Policy Analysis on Koshi River Basin in Bihar

Researchers: DM Diwakar, Biplab Dhak, Aviral Pandey, Neetu Choudhary and Rakesh Tiwary Findings: This study was primarily based on primary data collected from 11 districts of the Kosi river basin; namely Araria, Bhagalpur, Darbhanga, Katihar, Khagaria, Madhepura, Madhubani, Purnia, Saharsa, Samastipur, and Supaul. The findings of this study were based on literature review, household survey, group discussions and key respondents' information. The study presented a detail socio-economic profile of people living in this river basin and analysed food security issues, existing livelihood opportunities, community coping practices, government interventions, emerging alternatives, future perspectives and talks about interventions required for reduction in water related vulnerabilities. This study also emphasised on issue that how good practices of water management and water centric upstream- downstream cooperation can be promoted in this river basin.

Gender Dimension in Livelihood Processes: Reflections for Kosi Basin Dynamics

Researchers: D M Diwakar, Biplab Dhak, Aviral Pandey, Neetu Choudhary, Rakesh Tiwary Findings: The project is a component of the larger project titled "A Study on Socio-economic livelihood and policy analysis in the Koshi River Basin". The objective is to conduct a gendered analysis of livelihood dynamics in Kosi basin area. An inquiry into resource access, food security and coping mechanism against calamities, among female headed households in the region is being carried out. The underlying objective is to position 'gender' in the realm of socio-economic analysis of a flood prone region. The intent is also to identify the nodes for gender sensitive data collection.

Malnutrition among Women and Children in Bihar

Researchers: Neetu Choudhary and Abhijit Ghosh

Findings: This study attempted to offer an inter-temporal and spatial understanding into the dynamics underlying malnutrition among children and women in Bihar. The study projects that Bihar incurs an approximate annual economic loss of Rs. 150 - 200 Crores due to sub-optimal school performance of the stunted (48.3%) children below five years of age. It is found that Bihar has been able to arrest the prevalence of low Body Mass Index among women almost at comparable levels as other key states. However, this is not the trend for child stunting. The study concludes that malnutrition in Bihar is a group (typically various castes) phenomenon and it is this pattern that is keeping the average malnutrition levels in Bihar rather high. The SC group remains the most disadvantaged as far as progress towards nutrition security is concerned. The study re-asserts the centrality of gender roles and structure in child nutritional outcomes wherein many of behavioural factors are found to improve with women's education and their ability to exercise freedom of choice.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for Mahatma Gandhi Central University Motihari

Researchers: Vidyarthi Vikas and Kaushal Kishor

Findings: The main purpose of the Social Impact Assessment (SIA) was to assess the impact of Land Acquisition on prospect land-losers. Total 301 acres of land will be acquired for the same purpose. Most of the agricultural land is going to be acquired while a good number of residential, school, worship places will be acquired too. A good number of people will be affected directly/ indirectly. We found that project site is suitable and appropriate. Around 40 occupants (household family) will be displaced needs rehabilitation and resettlement. The study also provided the report on mitigation measures and estimate of the number of affected families, number of prospective land losers families among area to be acquired, socio-economic-cultural profile, social and economic impacts, rehabilitation, resettlement, and compensation issues based on land records and field verification.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for RCC Bridge across the River Budhi Gandak between Village Bhogari in West Champaran and Village Piparpati in East Champaran Parivojna

Researchers: Vidyarthi Vikas and Kaushal Kishor

Findings: The main purpose of the study was to assess the impact of Land Acquisition on prospect land-losers. We found that land was already acquired and bridge was made by the requisitioning authority without follow the land acquisition process under the Land Acquisition Act 2013. SIA study was carried out as a post facto assessment. Land losers have loosened their land without compensation yet to be.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for Siwan-Siswan State Highway in Siwan District

Researchers: Vidyarthi Vikas and Kaushal Kishor

Findings: The main purpose of the Social Impact Assessment (SIA) was to assess the impact of Land Acquisition on prospect land-losers. Total 19.0 acres land will be acquired. We found that alignment was suitable and appropriate. List of land losers has been provided by the district officials differ from ground reality. The study found that a good number of people will be affected directly/indirectly. Prospect land losers were in uncertainty on one time cash compensation. The project will smoothen the transportation between Siwan and Patna.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for Hajipur Ramdayalu Nagar Double Track Pariyojna

Researchers: Vidyarthi Vikas and Kaushal Kishor

Findings: The main purpose of the Social Impact Assessment (SIA) was to assess the impact of Land Acquisition on prospect land-losers. The SIA study examined the cost benefit analysis of the said project. The study also provided the report on fair compensation and Rehabilitation, & Resettlement based on land records and field verification. A good number of pucca houses will be acquired including land area. The project will accelerate the frequent movement of rails on given rail track.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition under Deegha Rail cum Road Bridge -'Link Road' Parivojna

Researchers: Vidyarthi Vikas and Kaushal Kishor

Findings: The main purpose of the Social Impact Assessment (SIA) was to assess the impact of Land Acquisition on prospect land-losers. The SIA study examined the cost benefit analysis of the said project. The study also revealed the mitigation measures and estimate of the number of affected families, number of prospective land losers families among area to be acquired, Rehabilitation, and Resettlement, and compensation issues based on land records and field verification.

On Going Projects

An Ethnographic Study of Nunia Caste

Researcher: Ajay Kumar Jha

Brief note: The Ethnographic Study was done to look into the status of the people of this caste in Bihar in the light of their socio-political and economic heritage over the years. It is one of the most neglected and marginalized castes in Bihar. Nunia caste people, over the years, were traditionally occupied in preparing salt from the soil. But in last few decades they have lost their trade in most parts of the state. Over a long time, they have been demanding to be placed in the scheduled caste category. Consequent upon this, the Government of Bihar has initiated and financed a study on this caste at the behest of the Government of India, Ministry of Social justice and Empowerment. The Study has been granted to A N Sinha Institute of Social Studies. The study is progressing in full swing. Field works are being carried out in the entire state.

Social Impact Assessment of Proposed Land Acquisition under the Project of H. L. Bridge across River in Ghanshyampur-Rasiyari Ghat in 6th km of Shivnagar Ghat of Darbhanga district

Researcher: BN Prasad

Brief note: Modernization and development are twin process of social reconstruction. Development projects are indispensable for modernization. It is a multidimensional opportunity for reconstruction of human settlement and production process that would be reflected in the standard of living of those affected as well as in the regional economy of the areas. Though it is essential for socio-economic progress, but it also causes pain to the people who are forcefully displaced. This study shall focus on socio-economic profile of villages and affected people by the project. Issues of compensation, people's aspirations, etc. will be examined. Major objective of the proposed study is to carry out a baseline survey to generate data and information to prepare an appropriate rehabilitation action plan. Specific objectives are to find out socio-economic and educational status of directly and indirectly project affected families, their living conditions, impact of project on surveyed areas, and to analyse people's reactions towards project and ascertained their preferences for Resettlement and Rehabilitation.

Social Impact Assessment of Proposed Land Acquisition under the Project of H.L.R.C.C. Bridge over River Kamla at Suthariya Ghat in Dharbhanga district

Researcher: BN Prasad

Brief note: Development project intends to assure economic benefits to all, especially those who are forcefully displaced. Such projects frequently result in direct negative impacts on some sections of the society. These people are the ones whose assets are taken by the authority as part of the project. Thus people living on, working on, or benefiting from the land and its related resources become losers. Such people become involuntarily displaced. Development brings structural change in the society. It is essential for socio-economic progress, but also painful for those who are displaced from their motherland. This study focuses on socio-economic profile of villages and affected people, examines issues of compensation and people's level of satisfaction. Major objective of the proposed study is to carry out a baseline survey to prepare appropriate rehabilitation action plan. Specific objectives are to explore socio-economic status of project affected families, their standard of living, to study the impact of the project on surveyed areas and to analyse people's reactions towards project and ascertain their preferences for Resettlement and Rehabilitation.

Monitoring and Assessment of Distribution of Pensions under Social Security Schemes, Government of Bihar

Researchers: Habibullah Ansari, Ajit Hansda, Kaushal Kishor

Brief note: Monitoring and assessment of all the social security schemes run by the government of Bihar by a third party was aimed to study the delivery mechanism of the government agencies at grassroots level, such as at Panchayats and to suggest the mechanism for improvements with objectives to monitor the actual distribution of pensions by holding Pension Distribution Camps (PDC) at Panchayats organised by the Block Development Officials (BDOs) between August 01 and 15, 2014; to find out the numbers of beneficiaries; to check payment of pension; to underline the difficulties faced by the beneficiaries and officers, to cover the opinions and roles of government officers and the people's representatives. That monitoring work was conducted on 1550 Panchayats under 36 districts of Bihar. Two districts namely Jamui and Sasaram did not participate in the monitoring work. It was possible only by deploying the NSS Volunteers of the one college of each district. One-day training programme at AN Sinha Institute of Social Studies, Patna involving NSS Programme Officers and at least two NSS Students of each college from each district was done.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for the Construction of Bridge and Approach Road on the western bank of Kamala River at Madhepur Thengaha Ghat in **Darbhanga District**

Researcher: Habibullah Ansari

Brief note: SIA was done for the land acquisition on 02 Maujas- Jadupatti and Thengaha in Darbhanga District for the project of Construction on Bridge and Approach Road on the Western Bank of Kamala River at Madhepur-Thengaha Ghat in Darbhanga district an important highway connecting NH-57 at Jhanjharpur through Madhepur in Madhubani District. Total area of land under impact of 02 villages- in Jadupatti was 1877.20 acres and in Thengaha was 1662.26 acres. Proposed acquire land was 6.995 and 3.80 acres which was 0.94% and 0.57% respectively. There were 3899 total households in the area out of which 133 were directly affected families which is 3.41% of the total households. Most of people had reported as good impacts due to project. They were hopeful that their life style would be changed by that Kamala Bridge. Overall a good impact on both the villages was found. The cost was less than the benefits. So it was recommended that the proposed land could be acquired after paying the appropriate compensation.

संवैधानिक स्थिति बनाम सामाजिक परिस्थिति : थारू जनजाति की समस्यायें एवं संभावनायें (Constitutional Status Versus Social Status: Problems and Prospects of Tharu Tribe)

Brief note: The study covers the multiple issues of Tharu community which is located in the Indo-Nepal low land region. Tharu community of Bihar was included under a Scheduled Tribe Group in 2003. The objective of the study was to examine the dynamic socio-economic-culturaland constitutional status in the existing society. The study also examines their capacity to receive benefits under constitutional framework to a greater extent. Since independence how they were transformed into a systemic society. Tharu as a caste included under a certain Scheduled Tribe Group, it may have an impact on their socio, economic, cultural and administrative development in the society. The study also examines their civilisation, culture, occupation, life style, and mainstream status in the society. The study also point out the problems and prospects of Tharu community.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for construction of High Level RCC Bridge with Approach Road near Aadibashi Tola of Saharaphool Village under K. Nagar Block in Purnea District, Bihar

Researchers: Kaushal Kishor, Renu Choudhary and Sandhya Rani Mahapatro

Brief Note: SIA Study of High Level RCC Bridge Project near Aadibashi Tola of Saharaphool Village under K. Nagar Block in Purnea District was done to assess the socioeconomic impact of land acquisition on affected people. For the purpose of Construction of high level RCC bridge with approach road at Adibasi Tola, 0.8875 Acre land was acquired in which there were directly and indirectly affected households. Household survey of affected people was done with the help of structured schedule and focus group discussion .The study finds while the negative consequences of SIA may realized in the short run during the project, long term impact will bring positive benefit and will bring changes in life of people living in the community. It was recommended timely provision of compensation and provision of alternative employment opportunities to the vulnerable group will be effective to overcome the mental stress of losing land and anxiety of getting compensation.

Social Impact Assessment of Land Acquisition for Construction of High Level RCC Bridge with Approach Road at Bakharikol Dhar under Majara Panchayat of K. Nagar Block in Purnea District, Bihar

Brief Note: SIA Study of High Level RCC Bridge Project at Bhakharikol Dhar to Bishahria Road under K.Nagar Block in Purnea District was done to assess the socioeconomic impact of land acquisition on affected people. For the purpose of Construction of high level RCC bridge

with approach road at Bhakharikol Dhar 1.57 acre land was acquired. Household survey of affected people was done with the help of structured schedule and focus group discussion. The study finds while the negative consequences of SIA may be realized in the short run during the project, long term impact will bring positive benefit and will bring changes in life of people living in the community. It was recommended timely provision of compensation and provision of alternative employment opportunities to the vulnerable group will be effective to overcome the mental stress of losing land and anxiety of getting compensation.

Ethnographic Study of Raj Dhobi Caste in Bihar

Brief note: The purpose of the proposed research is to carry out an ethnographic study including their socio-cultural and economic life, inter-personal and other equations with the neighbouring upper castes of the region, commensal relationships, social handicap like untouchability, rendering traditional services, level of literacy, occupational pattern, upward caste mobility of the Raj dhobi caste in Bihar and compare them with the Dhobi caste. Also to put forward a few suggestions based on the ethnographic findings.

Ethnographic Study of Mallah Nishad (Bind, Beldar, Chai, Tiyar, Khulwat, Suraiya, Godhi, Vanpar, Kevat) and Nonia Caste of Bihar

Researcher: Rajeev Kamal Kumar

Brief note: The main objective of the proposed study is to carry out the ethnographic survey of Mallah Nishad (Bind, Beldar, Chai, Tiyar, Khulwat, Suraiya, Godhi, Vanpar, Kevat) and Nonia Caste of Bihar. However the specific objectives of the present study are to conduct a detailed ethnographic study of the Mallah Nishad (Bind, Beldar, Chai, Tiyar, Khulwat, Suraiya, Godhi, Vanpar, Kevat) and Nonia of Bihar; to find out the socio-economic, educational, political and cultural status of the above mentioned castes and compare them with the Schedule Tribe; to find out the population of Mallah Nishad and Nonia of Bihar through secondary sources and, if they are not present, then estimate the same through a sample survey, study social handicaps like untouchability, rendering traditional services, commensal and other relationship with the upper castes of the region; to study the level of literacy, occupational pattern, upward caste mobility, etc.; and to put forward a few suggestions based on the ethnographic findings.

Social Impact Assessment Project on Construction of RCC Bridge with approach road across Nasi Tola Dhar in Damaili Panchayat, Purnea District, Bihar

Researchers: Sandhya Rani Mahapatro, Renu Choudhary, and Kaushal Kishor

Brief Note: The SIA study of Nasi Tola was done to assess the socio-economic impact of land acquisition on affected people. The project is located at Purnea District. (Purnea is located in the eastern part of Bihar.) Nasi Tola is situated about 15 km away from Sub-District Headquarter Dhamdaha and 35 km away from District Headquarter Purnea. For the purpose of Construction of high level RCC bridge with approach road at Nasi Tola, 0.75 Acre (75 Dismal) land was

acquired and 19 households were affected both directly and indirectly by this project. The study finds that there may be negative consequences of the SIA in the short run of the project. However in long term the impact will bring positive benefits and changes in lives of people living in the community. It was recommended that timely provision of compensation and alternative employment opportunities to the vulnerable group will be effective to overcome the mental stress of losing land and anxiety of getting compensation.

Farm-size and Productivity: A Study of Selected Farms in Bihar

Researcher: Vidyarthi Vikas

Brief note: The main purpose of the project is to examine the agricultural land productivity across farm sizes in Bihar. At the same time it will also answer the question of economic profitability and viability across the farm size. Earlier, very few studies had been carried out on this topic in the state. It now needs to be further studied to explore the structural changes vis a vis production relations in agriculture. Under production relations, the study will also explore local capitalism to some extent. Local capitalism in agriculture needs a separate study that will provide theoretical aspects, in the state. The study will also cover institutional aspects of agriculture in rising Bihar. Unfinished land reforms left unequal distribution of land holding, a case well known in Bihar. Land Reforms Administrative Training Programme

ANSISS has been conducting administrative training programmes since September 2014 for officials including ADMs, DCLRs, COs, SDOs of the state in collaboration with the 'Department of Revenue and Land Reforms' and 'Bihar Land Reform Core Committee'. The objectives of the programme have been to sensitize the local land

department officials about the present agrarian crisis and landlessness: to make aware them of land reforms perspective and enhance the understanding of land reforms acts, rules, circulars, and proceedings (with amendments); to motivate officials towards attitudinal change, better work culture and speedy delivery system; to enhance the capacity of office management, leadership, capacity building, and team-building for the implementation of land reforms policy. So far twenty-one such programmes have been



conducted. The 21st training programme was held during July 27-30, 2016. Ph. D Programme

The PhD programme lays emphasis on different dimensions of Social Sciences so as to equip the PhD students with an integrated framework within which various developmental and changing issues can be addressed. The programme is designed to develop issue based, inter-disciplinary, and applied as well as pure research orientation among the students so that they can understand the local, regional, national and international problems. It involves successful completion of six months pre-PhD course-work, consisting of Research Methodology and Core Subject, followed by submission of synopsis and formal registration in PhD Programme. PhD Course is affiliated to the Aryabhatta Knowledge University (AKU), Patna.

Pre-PhD Course Structure and Duration

The main purpose of pre-PhD course work is to encourage fundamental research aptitude among research scholars through systemic training in computer aided research methodology and interactions with contemporary social science debates. The underlying intent is to prepare the students for theoretical rigour as well as applied understanding. At the end of the course the students are expected to be familiar with review of literature, designing and developing their own research and locate it in the on-going discourse of their areas.

Pre-PhD course has been structured as per the guidelines of UGC. Students are required to undertake three papers (two compulsory papers - research methodology and computer application/data analysis; and one elective paper from their subject) which are to be completed within six months. Evaluation of this course will be done through a written examination, followed by an internal assessment through presentations by the students.

Fellowship

Institute offers ICSSR supported Doctoral fellowship. The fellowship is offered preferably in the subjects of: Economics, Agriculture Economics, Sociology, Social Anthropology, Political Science, Public Administration, Social Psychology, Social Geography and Non-violence and Peace Studies. The selection process involves a written test followed by an interview of short listed candidates with specified eligibility criteria. Women, minorities and candidates from educationally backward states are considered on priority basis.

Partnership

Formation of Partnership Forum Deal with Disasters in Koshi River Basin

Bihar State Disaster Management Authority (BSDMA) and Kathmandu based International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (ICIMOD) have joined hands with the ANSISS to create partners forum for addressing disaster related issues such as vulnerability of livelihoods, environment degradation and sedimentation in the Koshi basin. The partnership took off with signing and sharing of a Letter of Intent (LOI) for collaboration between the two institutions in the institute premises.

Other partners of the forum include the National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), New Delhi; Institute of Economic Growth (IEG), New Delhi; International Water Management Institute (TWMI), Colombo; Commonwealth Scientific Information and Research Organization (CSIRO); and the Indian Institute Technology (IIT), Kanpur. Under the umbrella of Koshi Basin program, being implemented by ICIMOD with financial aid from Australian Government, aforementioned local, national and International organizations are undertaking a number of studies to understand and address different socio-economic issues related to environment, disaster and livelihood in the Koshi basin, that originates in the Himalayan mountains in Tibet and flows through, China, Nepal and India.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of A. N. Sinha Institute of Social Studies, Patna - 800001 (Bihar), for the Year ending 31st March 2017 and also the Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date annexed thereto; and

We report that: -

- 1. Interests on Bank and other deposits have been accounted for on receipts basis, except where bank deducted tax (TDS). Interest on Fixed Deposits of different Funds have not been treated as income. since the same forms part of the fund and shown under Schedule "3".
- 2. The Institute is maintaining various bank accounts broadly classified under two heads. First is "Non-Earmarked Fund" which is used for administrative purpose. It is shown as "Total - B" in Schedule "6". Whereas second one is "Earmarked Fund" which is used only for Specific Purposes. It is shown as "Total - C" in Schedule "6".
- 3. Expenditure incurred against specific Funds / Grants from Govt., of Bihar and Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi and based on Grants received for various projects are departmental/Institute identification and allocation.
- 4. Amount received against any Project is treated as Liabilities under schedule "3" from the financial year 2011-12. Expense incurred against this Project is adjusted out of the same project. The Institute's share commonly known as "Overhead Charges" is treated as Income. It was explained that "Overhead Charges" on various projects has been charged regularly but in some previous years it is to be reconciled. Expenses incurred on various projects are subject to Certification.
- 5. Revenues are recognized on cash basis except in case where Tax has been deducted and amount has not been received till the end of the Financial Year, Government Grants and Grants for Projects are recognized as and when it is received. A separate reconciliation statement is required to be prepared with respect to Plan/Capital Grant for some previous years.
- 6. Project Advance and other advances as per List needs adjustment after obtaining proper supporting documents from the respective person to whom advances were sanctioned.

- 7. Annual physical verification of the items of fixed assets and other stocks owned / Possessed by the Institute has not been carried out. As such the actual position of the assets concerned and their reconciliation with the books could not be ascertained.
- 8. TDS Certificate is required to be obtained from various agencies and bank on quarterly basis.
- 9. Depreciation has been charged in the accounts on WDV basis as per the rates of income Tax Act, 1961. Details are as per schedule "4".
- 10.Security Money from Contractors ₹ 36,086.94 is standing and it requires adjustment as shown in Schedule - 3.
- 11.TDS on PF interest standing in as shown in Schedule 3 ₹ 2,995.00 requires to be written off.
- 12. Non-plan grant was received during financial year 2012-13 was deferred to the extent of ₹ 3,27,51,622. It was to be adjusted during financial year 2013-14, now the same has been added to Capital Fund in Schedule - I.
- 13. Refund is pending for TDS for the Financial year 2009-10 to 2012-13. It must be resolved.
- 14. In Schedule "3", an amount of Rs. 9,00,693/- standing as Receipts for Website. This needs adjustment and reconciliation.
- 15.Tax Deducted at Source (Old) requires write off.
- 16. There is difference in PF Deposit as per Schedule "5" and Balance as per Schedule "3". It needs reconciliation.
- There is difference in Staff Pension & Gratuity Fund as per Schedule "6" and Balance as per Schedule "3". It needs reconciliation.
